Letter from the Chief



It is an honor to present the 2018 Hendersonville Fire Department Annual Report to Mayor Barbara Volk, respected members of the City Council, City Management, and the Citizens of Hendersonville. The 2018 annual report provides you with a written and visual review of the accomplishments made by the Hendersonville Fire Department along with statistical data and future opportunities to improve the level of service our department delivers to the City of Hendersonville.

Our department continues to be fiscally responsible and provides exceptional customer service to the citizens of Hendersonville,

visitors and surrounding communities. This is extremely important as our community continues to grow along with our service demand. During the strategic planning process our citizens identified fire suppression, emergency medical and rescue as the top priorities along with arriving on-scene quickly to create a positive outcome. The study currently being performed by Brooks Innovative Solutions will give us guidance that will aid in future growth and assist with prioritizing capital expenditures.

As we continue to look towards the future, it is important to recognize our accomplishments from the last year. Our department was awarded the Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) grant in the amount of \$299,291.00 from the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for the hiring of three firefighters. We also developed a Cancer Prevention Program for our department and outfitted all apparatus with a decontamination kit to prevent members from continued exposure of carcinogens. Another great accomplishment was the donation of a 1991 American LaFrance Fire Engine to Henderson County Public Schools Fire Academy Program which will give students the opportunity to do practical skills on a working apparatus instead of having to simulate skills.

I would like to thank all the members of the Hendersonville Fire Department for their continued support, professionalism and commitment at every level of the organization. We will continue to advocate for progress utilizing a proactive approach that will enhance our safety and service delivery to the citizens of Hendersonville.


CITY OF HENDERSONVILLE & FIRE DEPARTMENT INFO

The City of Hendersonville is located in the center of Henderson County, along the Eastern Escarpment of the southern Blue Ridge Mountains, and serves as the county seat. The city is 6.93 square miles and the population as of 2017 was 14,189. This is a 19% increase since 2000.


The Hendersonville Fire Department was established in 1892 and is the busiest fire department in Henderson County. The department operates on an annual budget of \$ 3,036,097 and has a total of 37 members making up four divisions: Administration (3), Operations (30), Life Safety (3), and Training (1). The Department utilizes three rotating shifts working in 24 hour increments; which provides continuous coverage 365 days a year out of two fire stations. The members are broken into two Engine companies and a Ladder company. All employees are NFPA certified firefighters and emergency medical technicians at the basic level with the exception of the administrative assistant. Annually, the department responds to over 4,600 calls for service and maintains as ISO class 3 rating.



The City changes with the seasons, and truly cannot be measured by the 14,189 residents that call it home. The daytime population for the City is estimated to be around 30,000 due to the influx of people coming into the city for work and play. Hendersonville's median age is 47, which is 9 years above the median for the state.






OPERATIONS

The Hendersonville Fire Department has a minimum staffing of nine Firefighters each day and operates two engines and one ladder from two fire stations. Personnel operate on a modified L.A. schedule and performs various functions including fire mitigation, emergency medical services, hazardous material operations, and specialized rescue. The






PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

The Hendersonville Fire
Department created a new
District 3 in 2017 in order to
start tracking information
pertaining to emergency
incident responses on the south
side of the City. This enables us
to have factual data that can be
utilized when considering the
addition of a third fire station.
Adding this Station will reduce
response times dramatically,
increase our overall availability



within the City, reduce the reliability we currently have on mutual aid departments, and increase our overall safety and effectiveness.

We are currently working with Brooks Innovative Solutions to:



- Conduct a comprehensive study to produce a Fire Department Deployment study that clearly demonstrates historical, current and future demands for service, growth, identify gaps in coverage and provide recommendations for improvement.
- Study deployment for distribution (station sites), concentration (staff and equipment resources) including a specific analysis of existing and future station locations, with a complete review and testing of the department's current community risk assessment and standards of cover service level objectives.
- Conduct an analysis of the department's reliability and availability for response and the impact of mutual aid both given and received.
- Study current facility features compared to current industry practices.
- Conduct a fleet assessment with major component ratings and replacement schedule recommendations.

All analysis and findings for each study component will be evaluated for implications and compliance with specific regulatory guidelines, industry best practices, and market city benchmarking.

TRAINING

The Hendersonville Fire Department strives to provide its members with high quality training to ensure safe and efficient practices while operating on an emergency scene. The Administration oversees the delivery of training to firefighters, officers and staff in compliance with applicable local, regional, county, state and federal requirements. In 2018, our members participated in over 10,700 hours of training. Training delivery is conducted in the classrooms,

on training sites in the field, online, and self-directed reading.











Firefighters respond to a wide variety of emergency calls and need to be ready at a moment's notice to respond in an effective way that helps those in need while keeping themselves safe when in harm's way.



FIRE PREVENTION

The Hendersonville Fire Department Life Safety Division focuses on fire prevention & education, enforcement of the fire code, plans review, fire safety inspections, and fire investigations. They also manage our Knox Box program and work very closely with Henderson County Fire Marshal's Office and Code Enforcement Services.



WHAT HAPPENED IN 2018

The City of Hendersonville Fire Department was awarded a Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) grant in the amount of \$299,291.00 from the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) / Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for the hiring of three firefighters.

The SAFER grant is awarded for a period of three years. The grant will pay for 75 percent of the salary and



benefits for each of the three new firefighters in the first and second year of the grant; the third year of the grant funds 35 percent of salary and benefits. The new firefighters will increase the total fire department workforce to ten firefighters per shift.





The City of Hendersonville donated a 1991 American LaFrance Fire Truck to the Henderson County Public School Fire Academy Program. This truck will be utilized by high school students to enhance their learning and gain certifications in Firefighting.
