Hendersonville Police Department Public Monthly Report April 2024



Chief's Monthly Summary

April 29, 2024, will be recorded in history as the deadliest day for law enforcement in North Carolina. Four law enforcement officers were shot and killed and another four were shot and wounded as they attempted to serve an arrest warrant. It is difficult to understand the magnitude of the loss of life in the law enforcement community. As I write this, all four have been laid to rest and the others are recovering from their wounds. Our thoughts and prayers are with those wounded and the families of everyone affected by this hateful crime.

Besides the outcome, there is little we know about the incident. What we do know is that the U.S. Marshals Fugitive Taskforce attempted to arrest a person wanted for being a felon in possession of a firearm. When they arrived at the suspect's residence, they were immediately fired upon. The suspect was shot and killed by the taskforce members in return. There are also some unverified reports that at least one person shot at the taskforce members from inside the house. We will learn more in the coming weeks and months that we can hopefully use to prevent a similar tragedy from ever happening again anywhere.

It is a rare instance where so many officers are shot and killed in any one incident. Maybe the only worse single event in this nation was when Dallas PD lost five officers in the line of duty when they were ambushed by a lone gunman in 2016. Or, when four ATF agents were shot and killed in the daytime raid of the Branch Davidians compound in Waco, TX in 1993. These are monumental occurrences in this country providing law enforcement with many lessons learned. I am hopeful that we will learn from the Charlotte event and that we will never have such a profound incident ever again.

There are fewer dangerous situations than those involving a convicted felon in possession of a firearm. Clearly, the felon cares nothing about our laws or they wouldn't have been arrested and convicted of a felony in the first place. Choosing to possess a firearm only further shows their indifference to law and order. Gun control laws have no meaning for the felon who lives outside the laws we all abide to.

This country should focus on strengthening our existing laws rather than creating new ones. We need to put and keep criminals in jail when they blatantly break the law. I find it difficult to accept why dangerous criminals freely roam our neighborhoods and communities rather than being incarcerated for crimes they have already committed. Thankfully, we enjoy a "tough-on-crime" District Attorney and judges that hold people accountable. Together, we will keep Hendersonville safe from dangerous criminals.

Thank you again to those who support and trust us to do good work. We strive to be the best in everything we do. Thank you for giving us the opportunity to serve this community.

Safety Tip - Teen Driver Safety Tips

- Instill the importance of concentration behind the wheel.
- Explain the importance of driving defensively.
- Confirm they know exactly where they are going, even if you must scout the trip during daylight hours.
- Reiterate the dangers, and your outright prohibition of drinking and driving.
- If you have given your teenager an extended curfew, discuss how fatigue can also cause accidents.
