Hendersonville Police Department Public Monthly Report October 2022



Chief's Monthly Summary

It is official! Our new Traffic Safety Team, a Sergeant and two Officers, are actively working to make the roads safer in Hendersonville. Their first day on the job was October 1, 2022. They hit the ground running too, making a DWI arrest on the first day. Their primary focus will be investigating motor vehicle crashes and addressing traffic complaints. They will use the data we collect from reported crashes to determine what is most likely the cause of crashes, where crashes happen most, and the days and times of most crashes. With this data, we will be better able to strategically deploy resources and focus our attention on the most significant factor contributing to most crashes. Our end goal is to reduce the number and severity of crashes in the City of Hendersonville.

I am excited to finally get this team going. It has been a goal of mine since coming here in early 2021. While it is too early to know what impact they will have on traffic safety, my experience tells me that a team like this is highly effective in improving overall traffic safety in this city. If we accomplish this, we will reduce insurance premiums, have fewer injuries and property damage, and provide you with an overall sense of safety while driving through the city.

Also new this month is PowerEngage. For those unfamiliar, PowerEngage is a communication tool we use to share information with people who call our communications center. This month, we sent more than 500 texts to callers. Of those, almost 170 elected to provide us with feedback. In our first month, we received an overall approval rating of 90.97%. While this is a good start, we look to improve that rating over time. I hope you find this to be an effective method of providing information. Please let us know what you think about this service.

The last topic for the month is National Night Out. This was our second annual event, and I would say it was a huge success. We moved to 7th Avenue across from 2 Guys Pizza. Staff did an amazing job planning and hosting the event. If you missed it, come out next October. I promise it will be even better next year. Come see us poke fun at ourselves and the stereotype that cops love donuts (I mean, who doesn't?), you can drive in the DWI simulator, maybe breach a door and "pepper spray" (silly string) a bad guy, and just let your kids have fun for a couple of hours. Did I mention the hot dogs? We served more than 300 hot dogs too. I promise, it is a good and safe event.

As always, thanks once again for your support and your trust in us. I hope you find these monthly reports useful. If you do, tell your friends. The more people who read them, the more informed we are as a community. And, as always, we strive to provide "Mountain Excellence."

Community Tip

- Tip #4: Holiday shopping safety as you go about your holiday gift shopping, be smart and avoid becoming a victim of theft. We encourage you to follow a few safety tips.
 - > Keep receipts of all purchases.
 - > Write down serial numbers where applicable.
 - > Never leave shopping bags in plain view in your vehicle.
 - Place gifts in the back of your vehicle before you stop at your next location. That way no one knows exactly where your gifts are stored in your vehicle.
 - > Always, always, always lock your vehicle when parked.
 - Be smart about putting gifts under your Christmas tree if they can easily be seen from outside. Consider limiting the number of packages under your tree or placing them in such a way that someone looking in does not think of your house as a good target for a break-in.
 - Post pictures of holiday trips on social media when you get back. Ever seen "Home Alone?" Don't advertise that you are out of town.
 - Use timers on all home lighting when out of town.

- Ask the friends or neighbors you trust to keep an eye on your house while you are out of town. And make sure they have your phone number in case something happens.
- Schedule the police department to conduct house checks while you are away. This is a free service we provide upon request.
- Lastly, when the holidays are over, think about what cardboard boxes and trash you set at the curb. This tells criminals even more about what goodies are in the house and makes you a more attractive target for criminals.

Use of Reasonable Force (UORF) Incidents and Findings

- October 10, 2022 Officer used physical force to control a combative subject who caused a disturbance at a local business. No injuries to officer or suspect. Investigation determined this use of force was justified and lawful.
